

**COMMUNAL VIOLENCE, STATE POLICING AND CONFLICT-SENSITIVE RESPONSE IN  
NIGERIA:  
A POSITION PAPER ON THE ODEREMI VILLAGE INCIDENT, OYO STATE**

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**Abstract**

The killing and alleged sexual assault of Mrs. Misitura Akanke in Oderemi Village, Ido LGA, Oyo State, illustrates the spread of rural banditry into Nigeria's South-West and the gaps in rapid, accountable security response. This position paper analyzes the incident as a case study in communal violence, examines legal and operational failures in rural protection, and proposes a conflict-sensitive framework for response, resolution, and prevention. Drawing on constitutional provisions, plural policing theory, and the published works of Barrister Adebayo Akinade, the paper argues that effective response requires devolved policing with national standards, community early warning systems, and strict documentation and oversight protocols to prevent impunity and escalation.

## **1. Introduction**

In September 2025, Oderemi Village in Ido LGA, Oyo State, experienced a violent attack resulting in the death of Mrs. Misitura Akanke. Reports indicate she was ambushed while farming, sexually assaulted, and killed by suspected armed bandits. Oyo State Police reportedly arrested two suspects. The incident reflects a broader trend: the southward spread of rural banditry and the vulnerability of women and farmers in previously peaceful areas. This paper uses the incident to assess Nigeria's security response capacity and to propose policy measures that prevent recurrence without triggering communal retaliation.

## **2. Methodology**

The paper uses case study analysis, doctrinal legal analysis of the 1999 Constitution, and conflict-sensitive program design. It integrates empirical and theoretical insights from twelve monographs authored by Barrister Adebayo Akinade on security operations, policing, communication, agrosecurity, and communal conflict.

## **3. Incident Summary and Context**

According to the report:

- Location: Oderemi Village, Ido LGA, Oyo State
- Allegation: Sexual assault and murder by suspected armed bandits
- Response: Oyo State Police arrested 2 suspects
- Community perception: Growing fear among farmers, women, and travelers; concern over spread of banditry to South-West

This incident is not isolated. Akinade's *Communal Conflict and Violence: Response, Resolution and Prevention* shows that attacks on civilians in agricultural areas often escalate when state response is delayed or perceived as biased. *Agrosecurity, Bioterrorism and Environmental Protection* establishes that attacks on farmers constitute both a security and food security threat, requiring integrated protection strategies that link agricultural safety to national security.

## **4. Legal Framework and Jurisdiction**

Sexual assault and murder are offenses under the Criminal Code applicable in Oyo State. Investigation and prosecution fall under the Nigeria Police Force and the Oyo State Ministry of Justice. Section 33 and 34 of the 1999 Constitution guarantee the right to life and dignity. Section 14(2)(b) imposes a duty on government to ensure the security and welfare of the people. Failure to provide timely protection can constitute a breach of this duty.

## **5. Security Response Gaps Identified**

1. Response time: Rural areas like Oderemi lack immediate police presence.
2. Documentation: Poor chain-of-custody and incident reporting undermine prosecution.
3. Community-state disconnect: Limited integration of traditional rulers and community boards in early warning.
4. Oversight: Risk of abuse if policing is devolved without civilian oversight.

Akinade's *Communication Skills in Security Documentation in Law Enforcement* demonstrates that poor documentation directly contributes to impunity in sexual and violent crimes. *Security Operations, Crime*

Prevention and Good Governance establishes that localized policing reduces crime only when supported by clear command protocols and civilian oversight.

## **6. Policy Analysis: Plural Policing and Strategic Security Management**

The incident illustrates the core argument for carefully sequenced devolution. Local knowledge enables faster mobilization, but accountability requires standards and documentation protocols. Community Security Integration Boards can provide early warning and mediation, reducing the likelihood of retaliatory violence.

Akinade's Public Policing and Private Protection for Maximum Security provides the framework for integrating community vigilante groups, private security, and state police without conflict. Managing Strategic Security and Crime Prevention Models outlines sequencing models for crime prevention interventions in rural areas, emphasizing that capacity building must precede devolution of authority.

## **7. Community Policing and Early Warning**

Effective prevention depends on structured community engagement. Akinade's Community Policing: Strategic Approaches in Crime Prevention demonstrates that community policing reduces response gaps in rural LGAs when it is linked to formal security structures and governed by clear protocols. Early warning systems must incorporate traditional rulers, youth leaders, and market associations who detect unusual movements and intergroup tensions before they escalate.

## **8. Communication and Public Information Management**

Unverified viral videos and reports can inflame communal tension. Akinade's Communications in Security and Law Enforcement Operations recommends single incident command for public statements, timely factual briefings by police PROs, and engagement of traditional rulers to counter rumors. Security Culture, Diplomacy and Communication Skills in International Relations further emphasizes that strategic communication is essential to maintaining public trust and preventing panic during crises.

## **9. Immediate Response Recommendations**

For law enforcement:

1. Ensure forensic examination and preservation of evidence.
2. Apply Akinade's documentation protocols for chain of custody.
3. Provide witness protection where intimidation is alleged.

For Oyo State Government:

1. Deploy rapid response units to high-risk LGAs.
2. Activate the Community Security Integration Board in Ido LGA.
3. Provide psychosocial support through the Ministry of Women Affairs.

## **10. Medium-Term Prevention Framework**

1. Plural Policing: Establish certified state police units with federal oversight.
2. Early Warning: Train traditional rulers and youth leaders in conflict early warning indicators.
3. Peace Education: Integrate peace education into NYSC and secondary schools as outlined in Legal and Forensic Issues in Elections and Peace Education.

Akinade's Managing Strategic Security in Statecraft, Public Affairs and Foreign Relations argues that reform fails when operational capacity lags legal authority, justifying a phased approach to implementation.

### **11. Accountability and Oversight Mechanisms**

Civilian oversight boards at LGA level must monitor state police conduct. Mandatory incident reporting using standardized forms ensures transparency. Independent review of all sexual violence and homicide cases by the Oyo State Ministry of Justice prevents political interference.

Communication Skills in Security Documentation in Law Enforcement establishes the documentation standards necessary for accountability and evidence admissibility in devolved policing systems.

### **12. Role of Civil Society and NGOs**

Organizations like FIDA Nigeria and WRAPA can provide legal aid, monitor investigations, and advocate for victim support. Their involvement increases public trust. Akinade's Public Policing and Private Protection for Maximum Security outlines how civil society can serve as a bridge between communities and formal security actors.

### **13. Agrosecurity and Rural Protection**

Attacks on farmers undermine food security and rural livelihoods. Akinade's Agrosecurity, Bioterrorism and Environmental Protection recommends dedicated rural patrol units, farm community liaison officers, and environmental threat assessment protocols. Protecting agricultural communities requires dedicated funding for rural security infrastructure and integration of environmental intelligence into security planning.

### **14. Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning**

Indicators: Time to response, case conviction rate, community trust index, number of early warning reports acted upon.

Evaluation: Quarterly review by Oyo State Security Council with civil society participation.

Akinade's Managing Strategic Security and Crime Prevention Models provides the M&E framework for assessing crime prevention interventions and adjusting policy based on data.

### **15. Recommendations**

1. Adopt phased state policing with mandatory documentation and oversight standards.
2. Institutionalize Community Security Integration Boards in all LGAs bordering forest reserves.
3. Train all investigating officers on Akinade's documentation and communication protocols.
4. Establish a Victim Support Fund for survivors of sexual violence and homicide.
5. Conduct a security audit of all rural LGAs in Oyo State within 90 days.

### **16. Conclusion**

The Oderemi Village incident is a warning that banditry is expanding geographically and that current response mechanisms are inadequate. A conflict-sensitive approach that combines devolved policing,

strict documentation, community early warning, and public communication can improve response, secure justice, and prevent communal escalation. The frameworks in Akinade's published works provide a tested basis for this approach.
